Every year at our A.G.M., the same people attend, usually about 30 people. We are glad they do as they seem to care about how our association is governed. However, we have close to 300 members who let those 30 people make decisions for them. Often, the only time we hear from this "silent majority" is when they are not happy with those decisions. Are you okay with letting just 10% of our citizens decide who will run our country? Not likely. If you do not normally attend, ask yourself "Why not?" Yes, A.G.M.s can be all about the numbers, and yes, we need to approve the budget, but we also want your opinion regarding the direction we are going, and are looking for some innovative ideas. We have had some very lively discussions at previous A.G.M.s.

For example, we want to establish a Youth Membership category to address the growing number of younger families, and try to engage them in our affairs. This is important as our current aging volunteer corps will not be able to continue providing our programs and activities at the same level you have come to enjoy. We need more of our silent majority to help and we need to get younger families involved to provide support. We hope you all know our volunteers are the life blood of our organization and we are celebrating their accomplishments with a **Volunteer Appreciation** event on **April 27**. You may not know, but we have one paid employee, not counting our summer students, and the cost is subsidized by the government. Knowing that, you can imagine how many hours our volunteers have contributed to keeping the doors open, year after year...50 years to be exact!

Volunteering is an opportunity to build on your lifetime accomplishments and apply them to a new environment. Ten years ago, the current president announced that the golf course would have to be closed unless someone would take on the role of Outdoor Programs Director. I could not let this happen. Dave Johnson shared my enthusiasm for the game so we put our hands up to share the job. It was not an onerous role, and we quickly took up the challenge of trying to make a better course. Dean took up the ongoing challenge to make it what it is today. We then got the idea to add a bocce court to our sports programs. We solicited a grant and Dave and I (not to mention a few other volunteers) built the courts. Meanwhile, Lynne had also gotten involved with the board, and then took up the challenge of developing a new website for the organization. Here's the point--neither of us had had any experience with operating golf courses, bocce or websites, but we embraced the opportunity and are so glad we did.

Volunteering is not labour without reward. During our careers, we faced many challenges and, sadly, also had to endure bureaucratic obstacles, delays and frustrations that eventually made us happy to leave it behind. At Cedar Heights, we had the opportunity to use our imagination and creativity, unhindered by those obstacles. We could readily accomplish things with teams of like-minded people who wanted to make the organization's future better for the enjoyment of the members and the community. You should try it!

Our **new website** will be **launching in April** and it will be dramatically more dynamic than our current one. These events are possible only because of the time and





Hole #7 on the Cedar Heights golf course was a longstanding favourite before it was de-commissioned about three years ago. We have now been permitted by the Canadian Heritage Foundation to tell the story behind the long delay in getting the seventh green, now known as Area 7, into use.

The story begins with a recent "New Horizons for Seniors Program" in which the hillside structures between the lower and upper level of the golf course were rebuilt. This project involved extensive clearing and excavation. We missed an early sign that there was something special about Area 7 when Shovellin' Gord Shea unearthed what appeared to be a fancy lid for a 45-gallon drum. Work carried on.



It wasn't until two of our observant gardening volunteers, Shelley Wallace and Jennifer Godfrey, realized with an obvious degree of

concern and urgency (the exact moment being captured

on camera) that there was a certain s

tructure to all of the things that Chainsaw Dan Letourneau was cutting up. The eager volunteer that he is, it took a little



Chainsaw Dan to stop, by which time he had already excavated (and somewhat dismantled) what looked like a wall.

At Shelley's and Jennifer's urgings, the Board contacted Professor A. Ibolo, Head of the School of Viking Studies at the University of Lagos in Nigeria, who evaluated our photos. He opined, "This is irrefutable evidence of the furthest westward incursion of the Vikings in North America, far surpassing the wanderings of the Minnesota Vikings of the NFL clan."

Don't be shy to thank Shovellin' Shea and Chainsaw Dan for their discoveries, however unintentional, and Shelley and Jennifer for their keen powers of observation, and their initiative that led to the halting of work on the site before it was lost forever. As a result of their energy and diligence, Cedar Heights will be recognized permanently in our country's history books.
