PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

What is the difference between price and value? What is the value of a community association? What is the price you are willing to pay to have a community association, in time, money or both? These are questions that we need to ponder at Cedar Heights Community Association.

If you are a member of Blind Bay Memorial Hall society, you know that the difficulty in filling the Board of Directors is threatening to close the doors by the end of November. Incorporated societies must have an elected Board to continue operating. We are no different.

In light of that situation the questions above are highly relevant to all local residents and to the members of community associations. At Cedar Heights we are blessed with having almost 400 members, which most associations don't have. This is the result of having the indoor and outdoor facilities that allow us to provide programs, activities and events that are valued enough to justify membership. They are expensive, but they are worth it. The alternative is driving into Salmon Arm which most of us don't want to do especially in the winter.

We must not take this situation for granted, however. Cedar Heights Social Centre only exists because members are willing to contribute time and money to ensure the lights are on, the heating (and cooling) systems work, the snow is cleared, the greens and fairways are mowed, the insurance bill is paid and the fridges and freezers work. Not to mention the wonderful volunteers who plan and organize everything that goes on at the Centre. which has impacted local businesses and our own golf revenues dramatically. You will also learn that our attempts to secure grants to support our ongoing efforts to continue with our capital projects have also been unsuccessful as so many organizations seeking funds have overwhelmed the capacity of granting agencies.

To make a long story a bit shorter, while we haven't had a great financial year to date, we have been very successful at continuing to provide programs and events members enjoy. In order to continue this in 2025 we may have to curtail some of our more ambitious projects.

Finally, as the situation at Blind Bay Hall demonstrates, unless the members are willing to step up and take on leadership positions the whole process can unravel. You will have received the notice of the fall meeting and a call for nominations and they are also included in this newsletter. *My own retirement as President is looming, and unless members are willing to fill our Executive positions we may need to close the doors at the end of December, which would be a terrible loss for the community.*

We've worked hard at the Board the last few years ensuring we have funds set aside to meet expenses down the road and we have done all the heavy lifting so our successors will have less of a workload. The updated Strategic Plan lays out a clear and straightforward action plan. The Board does not place an onerous burden on Directors and I will be staying on as Past President to provide assistance.

FIRESMART FALL CLEAN-UP DAY

Past Issues

This past summer, the CHCA took steps to help reduce the local wildfire risk, including the removal of 25 dead cedars adjacent to the laneway, the groundup limbing of other healthy firs on the golf course and the de-cluttering of the treed area behind the upper parking lot.



In addition, a fixture volunteer event at CHCA has been the **Fall Cleanup** of the grounds whereby CHCA volunteers help cleanup accessible ground fuels (branches, cones, etc). It is that time again! On **Wednesday, October 16**, the fine people at BC FireSmart will provide a disposal bin for us to fill with brush and other flammable woody materials. In addition, they will provide funds for **lunch for our volunteers** after the work is complete. Due to the hard work of our volunteers during past cleanups, complemented by the contracted work already completed this past summer, **our goal this year is one bin/one morning**. Once we have completed our mornings work, any room left in the bin will be available for our Cedar Heights neighbours.

If this interests you, look for the signup sheets, volunteer for the morning from **9:00 till 1:00 pm**, stay for lunch and help increase our wildfire resilience.

Damage to our Golf Course and Bocce Courts

Blair Holmes our greens keeper discovered the golf course and bocce courts have been damaged by several people riding motorized bikes on our property over the long weekend. As you can image he is angry and frustrated as he has spent hundreds of hours this spring and summer mowing the grass and working on the greens, and they have never looked better.

Unfortunately, our cameras have not captured the vandalism so we cannot identify anyone. However we know that some local residents feel that Cedar Heights Community Association property is a public park and that some actually tell their kids to ride on the golf course as they feel they have a right to do so.

Perhaps we will have to purchase cameras used in the bush to film wildlife, which seems to be appropriate here, although an additional expense. Once we are able to identify those responsible, we will be passing the information on to the police. Everyone should be held accountable for the consequences of their actions. damages they incur. Our members must bear the burden of repairs to our property when vandalism occurs. In the past this has included extensive damage to our kiosk which was costly to repair.

It would be better for everyone to understand that our property is not a public playground and ensure that neither they nor their kids use it like that. Let's keep our eyes open and get the word out.


